Here are just a few of the things we have done in our Women's Ministry program over the last year.

"Sip and Share" - Meeting in a room in the church, everyone brings a drink or dessert and something that has made an impact on us to share with the group. It could be a favorite podcast or book, a product that we love, or even a story or idea.

**Small Groups** - We have recently gone through the books "Lies Women Believe" by Nancy DeMoss Wolgemuth and "The Armor of God" study by Priscilla Shirer. We keep it simple with volunteers bringing desserts for the group and meeting at the church on a weeknight for a couple hours.

**Sword Challenge** - This was a short-term small group of women dedicated to memorizing Bible verses over a four-week period. We met virtually each week using the Signal app to share our progress and any tips we found helpful.



Sister Church Weekend - We just had our first annual event where we invite one to two churches in the conference, along with the local ones in the Gallatin Valley. We host a dessert potluck with a message from a speaker on Friday evening and spend the next day together in Sabbath school, church, and a fellowship meal. We wrap it up with a relaxing soak at the Bozeman Hot Springs where we can talk and make deeper connections with our sisters from around the state. Keeping the weekend to a one-night stay helps make it doable and we are excited to keep this new tradition going.

# Rahab

Taking a small step of faith can take a lot of courage.

Fear stands between us and the things God calls us to accomplish.

In a country teetering on the brink of war, a woman faces a choice. She can remain loyal to her side or run the risk of helping the enemy. So, when the Jericho police came pounding on Rahab's door looking for two Hebrew spies, Rahab didn't turn in the spies to them. Instead, she hid them on her roof and lied about where they had gone. Why did she risk her own safety and security for a couple of random strangers?

Rahab herself makes her reason clear when she tells the spies: "I know that the Lord has given this land to you and that a great fear of you has fallen on us, so that all who live in this country are melting in fear because of you" (Joshua 2: 9).

Rahab took a risk, defied the law, and hid the spies because she had heard amazing things about their God. She didn't know much about this God, but she wanted to throw in her lot with what she believed would be the winning side.

Common sense would argue that in a confrontation between the nomadic Hebrews and the strong walled city of Jericho, the Hebrews would be easily defeated. But Rahab had heard the tales of the exodus from Egypt, the parting of the Red Sea, and the other mighty miracles God had worked in the wilderness. On the strength of what she'd heard about Israel's God, she was willing to risk not only her own safety, but that of all her family. That was the price she demanded from the spies in return for her silence: when they captured the city of Jericho, Rahab and her entire extended family would be saved.

The spied agreed. They told Rahab to hang a scarlet cord in the same window through which she let them escape. On the day they captured Jericho, if they saw the red cord in the window, they would save Rahab and her family from the city's destruction.

How often has God called you to take a risk for Him? Have you been given the opportunity to do something that might earn you disapproval or even punishment, just because you followed God's will and did the right thing? How did you respond?

We can never know until we face a crisis how we might respond. On the afternoon before the spies came, if you'd asked Rahab whether she would defy her own king in order to protect Hebrew spies, she might not have known the answer. But when the crisis came, she was ready. She made her choice; she hung out the red cord.

Every day we face choices. God calls each of us to take risks for Him. There's the risk of loving someone when we know we might get hurt. The risk of standing up for what we believe is right in the face of ridicule. The risk of using our talents for Him even though others may not understand or appreciate what we're doing.

What holds us back from taking a risk? Fear is usually the biggest culprit. Fear stands between us, and the things God calls us to accomplish.

What drives us forward? What can inspire us to step out in faith, to hang the red cord in our windows? The more we know about God and His power, the more we will be willing to risk for Him.

Against all odds, Rahab believed that the God of the Hebrews had the power to deliver the mighty, walled city of Jericho into the hands of the rag-tag army of escaped slaves.


Do you know enough about the power of God to trust Him in your own life? As you look at the circumstances surrounding you today, success and victory may seem like a long shot—just like making the walls of Jericho fall by marching around them was a long shot. But it happened, because God had promised it would.

The Bible records what happened on that day when the Hebrew army marched into the ruins of Jericho: "The young men who had done the spying went in and brought out Rahab, her father and mother and brothers and all who belonged to her...Then they burned the whole city and everything in it...But Joshua spared Rahab...with her family and all who belonged to her, because she hid the men Joshua had sent as spies to Jericho—and she lives among the Israelites to this day" (Joshua 6:23-25).

Rahab trusted a God she barely knew—enough to hang a red cord in her window as a sign of her faith. Can you do the same?


